PRESIDENT’S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2024/25

It is with mixed feelings that I present this report on National Trust activities for the year November 2024—November 2025. Taking over from Ismeth Raheem, Professor Nimal de Silva had functioned as our President from November 2024 until his sudden passing away in May 2025. One of the founders of the National Trust, Professor Nimal was a tower of knowledge and goodwill, who will be missed by us all. He was looking forward to special celebrations this year as the Trust completes 20 years.

As President-elect, I had to take over these responsibilities at a time of major change for the National Trust when the Trust office had to be relocated from the PGIAR at their request, to the new premises at the Sri Lanka Association for the Advancement of Science (SLAAS). Consequent to the relocation, the Trust has made a donation of Rs 150,000 to the PGIAR to mark our understanding of the present economic crisis and pledged to continue extending our programs and projects to its students and the library in the future. Thanks to the cooperation of all the Trustees led by Professor Dhammika Chandrasekara, Senior Vice President and the dedication of office manager Mrs. Zeena Perera, the relocation was done swiftly, and the new office began to function almost immediately in much better surroundings and facilities. I specially acknowledge the assistance of Dr. Kanag-Isvaran, former President of the National Trust, who gave invaluable and speedy advice on the legal position, while checking the letters and

documents signed at this time. I also thank our Secretary General, Dr. Vijith Kannangara, who took over from Dr. Nilan Cooray in May 2024, supported by Professor Enoka Corea, who was appointed as Asst. Secretary General from July 2025 filling the vacancy of Jayatissa Herath.

The Trustees have given priority to carrying out the new projects initiated by Professor Nimal de Silva as part of the anniversary celebrations of the National Trust, such as the competition for Intangible Heritage Publications in all three languages, the awards for which will be made in November. The Trustees will also take forward Professor Nimal's wish to publish a series of Sinhala language books on recording vanishing heritage, whether in printed form or online.

On behalf of the Trust, I wish to thank the numerous speakers who have addressed us at the monthly lecture programs on the last Thursday of the month. Lectures were held regularly during the period January 2024-November 2025, at times with very short notice, some of which events also enabled the speakers to publicize their new books and offer them to the audience at a special price.

The Trust continues to organize its popular excursions led by one or more of the Trustees, such as in September 2024, when the Trust organized a one-day excursion to heritage sites in Kurunegala led by Professor Chandrasekara and Prof. Manawadu, which was received with enthusiasm by the members. In April 2025, the Trust organized a two-day excursion to Ruhuna, led by Professor Nimal de Silva and Professor Chandrasekara, assisted by Trustees Professor Enoka Corea and Luxshmanan Nadaraja

which was appreciated by the many participants. Following the recent lecture on Polonnaruwa by Professor Chandrasekara, there were many requests for the Trust to organize an excursion to this historic site, which is now planned for the first quarter of 2026.

I must take this opportunity also to thank the Scientific Committee currently chaired by Trustee Dr. Kavan Ratnatunga and its secretary, Prasad Fonseka for initiating and following up on the publications in the pipeline. A new book in the National Trust Prestigious Volumes series, on The Story of Furniture in Sri Lanka by Ayesha Abdul Rahman has gone to print and is likely to be released in early December 2025. Two books also in the Prestigious Volumes series on Lighthouses and Irrigation Works are nearing finalization and expected to go to print in 2026. Any offer of sponsorship for the printing of these forthcoming publications will be welcome.

I also thank the Management Committee for their continuing assistance throughout the year to the Trust office, managing the finances, updating the website and ensuring compliance with the changes in the legal and tax regulations. Trustee Dhammika Siriwardene is specially thanked for supervising on a daily basis the payments and accounts of the Trust office and overseeing the audit requirements.

Finally, some mention of the Special Projects, some initiated in 2024 and carried over to 2025, which include the distribution of the Schroeder gift of valuable Buddhist heritage publications and planning for the Kitting Murals exhibition in Galle.

I would like to conclude these brief remarks by stating that my Presidency will be very much a team effort in which each and every one of the Trustees has been called upon to assume some responsibility so that going forward we will build a strong and sustainable organization. While our prime focus is on recording the island's vanishing heritage, both tangible and intangible, we should make every effort to maintain the financial viability of the National Trust, of which the backbone has been our publications. These publications are kept at a low cost by deliberate policy in order to have the maximum public outreach, and we are thankful to the support extended by our members in this regard.

In conclusion, I wish to inform that all AGM documents presented today will be placed on the NT website. Members will be invited to send in their comments or observations in writing. The November monthly lecture will have three parts, the reading of the AGM documents to the members, which will be followed by the Award Ceremony for publications on Intangible Heritage and thereafter our tribute to the founder, the Roland Silva Memorial Lecture.

SECRETARY GENERAL’S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2024

Members of The National Trust – Sri Lanka,

It is my pleasure to present the report on the activities and programs of The National Trust Sri Lanka for the year ended 31st December 2024.

I am pleased to record that at the year-end we had a strong body of 926 members, including 297 Life Members (figures include members who are yet to renew their subscriptions). The steady increase in membership reflects the growing recognition of the Trust’s work in the protection and promotion of the tangible and intangible heritage of Sri Lanka.

PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

The year commenced with the conclusion of the Edward Atkinson Hornel photographic exhibition series, with the final events held in Galle and Matara in January and February 2024.

The Trust continued to conduct its regular monthly public lecture series, our flagship program, which draws a broad audience of members, academics, and the general public. These lectures were held at the Auditorium of the College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka, Colombo 7, in a hybrid format, enabling both in-person and online participation.

The lectures in 2024 covered a remarkable range of topics reflecting the diversity of Sri Lanka's cultural and natural heritage:

January 2024 – (Dr. Roland Silva Memorial Lecture)

“Story of Thrones and Crowns of Sinhale Royalty” by Prof. Nimal de Silva

February 2024 – “Temple Paintings during Colonial Period” by Prof. Chandanie Wanigatunge

March 2024 – “Intaglios: the rich heritage of Sri Lanka's movable cultural objects” by Luxshmanan Nadaraja

April 2024 – “Ancient Glass Bottle Finds from Sri Lanka's Sea-bed” by Dr. Malik Fernando

June 2024 – “Heritage Values of the City of Kandy from its residents' perspective” by Dr. Kapila D. Silva

July 2024 – “Sri Lanka and the Silk Road of the Sea” by Dr. Sanjiva Wijesinha

August 2024 – “The Building of a ‘New’ Identity: Mandapams of Jaffna Temples” by Prof. T. Sanathanan

September 2024 – “Endemism & Extinction: The Hallmark of Island Biodiversity” by Prof. Sampath Seneviratne

October 2024 – “The Prince Balaina (A son of VI Parakramabahu?) and his Clan in China

and Taiwan” by Prof. Gamini Ranasinghe

November 2024 – (Prof. Senake Bandaranayake Memorial Lecture)

“The Grand Designs of Ancient Lanka – Delving into the technology arising from ancient texts and archaeological remains, with special reference to the Mahathupa” by Shereen Amendra

These lectures, delivered by distinguished scholars and professionals, continued to attract significant audiences, both in person and online. They provided an invaluable forum for the dissemination of research and for engagement with Sri Lanka’s heritage.

The Trust records its gratitude to all speakers for their generous contributions in an honorary capacity.

PUBLICATIONS

The National Trust continued its important program of publishing high-quality books on subjects of cultural and natural heritage.

The Textile Heritage of Sri Lanka by Greeta Van Geyzel was completed and printed during the year, while work continued on other titles, including Lighthouses of Sri Lanka, Irrigation Heritage, Furniture of Sri Lanka, and Coins of Sri Lanka. The Trustees also discussed reviving the Small Books Series to feature rare and specialized topics for documentation and posterity.

The Trustees place on record their appreciation to the members of the Scientific Committee, authors, editors, designers, printers, and sponsors whose contributions make this publication program possible.

TOURS AND OTHER ACTIVITIES

The quarterly tour program, which resumed after a long hiatus, was successfully re-launched with a heritage tour to Kurunegala led by Prof. D.P. Chandrasekara and Prof. S. Manawadu, which drew strong participation and positive feedback from members. We ended the year with plans underway for a southern heritage tour in January 2025, to be led by Prof. Nimal de Silva.

DISTRIBUTION OF DONATED PUBLICATIONS

The Trust also facilitated the distribution of books donated by Mr. Ulrich von Schroeder, including *Buddhist Sculptures of Sri Lanka*, *Bronze Sculptures of Sri Lanka*, and *Buddhist Statues in Tibet*. The initiative, a brainchild of Archt. Ismeth Raheem, was managed under his supervision. The cost of shipping and clearing was met through donations from Trustees and selected individuals to whom a limited number of remaining copies were given.

The Trustees wish to thank Mr. Schroeder for this valued contribution.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

Financially, the Trust remained strong in 2024. A total income of Rs. 11,650,882 was

generated, against an expenditure of Rs. 6,677,717, resulting in a net surplus before tax of Rs. 4,973,165.

The sources of income included membership fees, sale of publications, interest from fixed and savings deposits, and contributions from donors, sponsors, and well-wishers.

On behalf of the Trustees, I wish to thank M/s Ernst & Young for auditing our accounts for 2024, and to record our appreciation for their professional services rendered to the Trust over many years.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The National Trust gratefully acknowledges the continued support and collaboration of ICOMOS Sri Lanka, the Department of Archaeology, the Central Cultural Fund, the Department of National Museums, and the Postgraduate Institute of Archaeology, which continued to host our office at 407, Bauddhaloka Mawatha, Colombo 7.

As always, our achievements are the result of the teamwork, dedication, and enthusiasm of the Trustees, Management Committee members, Scientific Committee, and the Office Manager, Ms. Zeena Perera, whose efficient coordination enabled smooth operation of the Trust's programs throughout the year.

Our sincere thanks are extended to all members, sponsors, and well-wishers whose generosity sustains the Trust's work in preserving and promoting Sri Lanka's cultural and

natural heritage.

With confidence in our plans for the coming year, I am happy to conclude that 2024 has been a productive and consolidating year for The National Trust Sri Lanka.



1. INFORMATION OF NATIONAL TRUST – SRI LANKA

1.1 General

The National Trust – Sri Lanka was founded on the 27 of May 2005. Being an Association not for gain, the Minister of Justice, by his Order made under Section 114 of the Trust Ordinance and published in the Government Gazette Extraordinary No. 1575 / 26 dated 14th November 2008, declared the trust, a body corporate with perpetual succession.

1.2 Principle Activities and Nature of operations

The objects of the Trust are protecting and safeguarding the tangible and intangible cultural and natural heritage of Sri Lanka including sites, monuments, sculptures, paintings, artifacts, music, dance, the fauna and flora of Sri Lanka.



2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 General Policies

2.1.1 Basis of Preparation

The Statement of Financial Position and Statement of Financial Activities together with Notes, ("Accounts") of the Trust as at 31 December 2024 and for the year then ended, comply with the Accounting Policies and Notes of the Trust.

These Accounts presented in Sri Lanka Rupees have been prepared on a historical cost basis.

2.1.2 Comparative Information

The accounting policies have been consistently applied and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

2.1.3 Income Tax

Income tax is provided in accordance with the provisions of the Inland Revenue Act No. 24 of 2017, on the profits earned by the Trust and is based on the elements of income and expenditure reflected in the Statement of Financial Activities.

2.1.4 Inventories

Inventories have been valued at their actual cost.

2.1.5 Trade and Other Receivables

Receivables are stated at the amounts they are estimated to realize.

2.1.6 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash equivalents comprise cash in hand and demand deposits together with short term, highly liquid investments, readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.1.7 Property, Plant and Equipment

a) Cost

Property, Plant and Equipment are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.

b) Depreciation

The provision for depreciation is calculated by using a straight line method on the cost or valuation of all Property and Equipment other than Land, in order to write off such amounts over the estimated useful lives by equal installments as follows;

Computer Equipment & Accessories	Over 04 Years
Furniture and Fittings	Over 10 Years
Equipment for Kandy Transmission	Over 12.5 Years
Office Equipment - Digital Camera	Over 05 Years

Depreciation is computed on straight-line basis.

2.1.8 Liabilities

All known liabilities as at the Statement of Financial Position date are included in the Accounts.

2.1.9 Revenue Recognition

Income is recognized on a cash basis.

2.1.10 Expenditure Recognition

Expenses in carrying out the activities of the Trust are recognized in the Statement of Financial Activities during the period in which they are incurred. Other expenses incurred in administering and running the Trust are accounted for on an accrual basis and charged to the Statement of Financial Activities.
